The GNWT launched a new online portal to provide residents a digital point of access for government programs and services in one location. The eServices portal is safe, secure, and private.

Currently there are four programs and services available on the eServices portal, including Apprenticeship. **Trades** and Occupation Certification (ATOC), Student Financial Assistance, Licences. and applying for Fishina and renewing NWT Health Care Cards. Driver and Vehicle services will also be added to the eServices portal in the near future. The GNWT is committed to increasing the number of programs and services available online and will be regularly releasing new bundles of eServices.
