Spring has sprung - I think? It is at least certainly very near. And with spring comes warmer temperatures and new growth. Speaking of growth, with the opening of our borders and further investment into the mineral sector, the NWT looking forward to growth not only in gardens but across sectors of the economy. During our 2022-23 Budget Session, we projected a \$131 million operating surplus, with revenue at \$2.3 billion and total expenditures at \$2.142 billion.

The COVID-19 related State of Emergency in the NWT was lifted, and as of April 1, 2022 COVID-19 restrictions have been removed. The lifting of restrictions brought relief and joy to some, but to others it brought with it another wave of anxieties. Our office has actioned answers to some of the questions that came as a result of the changes including: the availability of 4th booster shots, the prospective of further mask mandates, rules in schools and public places, COVID-19 case number accuracy. Sometimes the answers are a moving target because of the still changing nature of this pandemic and the global response to it. Please continue to engage my office with your concerns as the GNWT continues to face each new phase and stage of this pandemic.

One of the benefits many are feeling with restrictions lifting is that more community events have been taking place. I was pleased to have the opportunity to contribute funds to the Snow Castle, Ecology North's Earth Week, and the upcoming Warm The Rocks in Samba k'e park on July 15. If you are planning a free and public event for the community, please get in touch with my office and we will gladly see if your event qualifies under the Constituency Expense Allowance.



Budget Highlights

- 1. Budget 2022 proposes \$43 million of increased spending over Budget 2021, consisting of \$86 million for program enhancements, \$9 million in new spending for mandate priorities and \$2 million in amortization. This spending is offset by \$54 million in savings from programs that are ending.
- 2. Budget 2022 did not contain any new taxes, although property mill rates and some fees will be indexed to inflation to maintain financial management practices. The five year fee reviews underway in 2021-22 may result in further changes in fees. As part of the discussions with MLAs on the passing of the budget, it was agreed that the tobacco tax would be increased.
- 3. The carbon tax rate will increase to \$50 per carbon-equivalent tonne of greenhouse gas emissions on July 1, 2022. Carbon tax revenue will be returned to NWT businesses and residents through rebates and the Cost of Living Offset and also used for investments to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.
